FamilySearch

FamilySearch has expanded the public preview of its next generation web site. The beta test site can be accessed at http://fsbeta.familysearch.org

The site includes a new look, a new navigation system, and a host of revised features. They hope visitors will provide feedback to improve the experience and a new "feedback" tab is prominently placed on the right side of each page.

One of the most obvious changes is a new search engine for finding and viewing records. The new search engine manages multiple databases, indexes, and images. Although still under development, visitors can freely search hundreds of millions of names from a wide range of records.

Coastguards of Yesteryear

This site is dedicated to the Coastguards who lived and worked around the **Irish** coastline between the 18th and early 20th centuries. It includes a collection of Coast Guard Station photos as well as facts and figures about the people; births, deaths, census information. Also included are some fascinating accounts of bravery during rescues from shipwrecks as well as interesting articles about shipwrecks and rescues.

From October 1831 until October 1921, the Boston Pilot newspaper printed a "Missing Friends" column with advertisements from people looking for "lost" friends and relatives who had emigrated from Ireland to the United States. GenWed.com is a free genealogical research database for marriage records and a directory to other marriage records online for the United States, Canada, and the United Kingdom. Most are free but some are in marked professional or subscription databases. Most of the more than 25,000 marriage records in the free database were submitted by visitors who added records they had found during their own search for family history.

North Irish Horse in the Great War

This site explores the experiences of soldiers of the North Irish Horse during the First World War. It covers the five Squadrons sent to France from 1914 to 1916, as well as the 6th Inniskilling Dragoons (Service Squadron), which became part of the 2nd Regiment North Irish Horse in 1916, the V Corps Cyclist Regiment formed when the 1st Regiment was dismounted in early 1918, and the 9th (North Irish Horse) Battalion, Royal Irish Fusiliers, formed when the 2nd Regiment was dismounted and merged with the 9th Battalion in September 1917.

The site draws on official records, contemporary references and later recollections, along with a gallery of photographs, extracts from war diaries and casualty lists.

Surname Distribution Map





At "Who Do You Think You Are?" Live 2010 last February, Malcolm Pether from RootsMap offered to supply a *free* surname distribution map to each of our members. RootsMap is a family run business, established after many years' experience in research.

The maps show the distribution of households in Ireland by county, based on Griffith's Valuation 1847-1864. You can see an example of an Irish Surname Map on the Home page.

He will supply one map per member, showing the name of your choice, either in Ireland or Great Britain.



On the Shining Bann - Records of an Ulster Manor By R. M. Sibbett



A CD version of this out of print book, first published in 1928, is now available. It is a history of the manor of Cashel, the area around Portglenone, County Antrim, and gives a great deal of information about the local families. The author, R. M. Sibbett was born in 1868 in Killycoogan, Portglenone and had a great love for his birthplace. When writing his book about the area, Mr Sibbett accessed an original Grand Jury Book (1769-1825) and incorporated much of its wealth of historical and family details. The book is in searchable PDF format.

Birth Search

The General Register Office maintains a public search room in which the general public and genealogists can search computerised indexes. Facilities have greatly improved in recent months, and there is now a much bigger room with about 20 computer terminals. Booking time has also improved and it is possible to book an Index Search within a week or two.

Details for booking are on their website under Family History and Research (in the list on the right of the screen).

All searching is done at a computer terminal, and the new digitized birth index is now available. This is a brief guide and mock up of the search screen.

District			District is a drop down list, but it's best to leave this field empty, as there are so many options.

You do not need to complete all fields, but you **must** fill in at least the child's surname and **one** of the date options. The maximum year range is ten years.

This new database enables you to search using the mother's maiden name. So you can look for a particular child, or if you put in the child's surname and the mother's maiden name with a year range of ten years you will see all children registered by those parents in that year range.

There are transcription errors so you will need to try alternative spellings. Members of staff welcome being given a note of any errors, and they will pass them on for correction.

The Birth Registration Reference Number is needed if you wish to order a certificate.

This new index allows you to see the mother's maiden name and the date of birth.

The result of your search will look like this:

To access more information such as where the birth took place or the father's address you will need to request a 'Verification', and a member of staff will show you a scan of the registration entry on another computer screen.

Four verifications are included in the £12 fee for an index search (9.30am-3.30pm), and you pay £3 for each additional one.

The new index of deaths will be available soon.
