#### NATIONAL LIBRARY OF IRELAND



On the National Library of Ireland website are digital images of microfilms of R.C. parish registers which had been microfilmed in the 1950s and 1960s.

The images are browsable by parish at: <a href="http://registers.nli.ie/">http://registers.nli.ie/</a> and there is a map facility on the Home page to help find the correct parish.

The churches did not all send their registers to Dublin and one of those which didn't is Holy Family Parish Church, Belfast. Members of the Society have transcribed the records of Holy Family and they are available in the Randal Gill Library and as a "look up" for members.

Surnames are listed on our website and the full transcription is available to members.

Births 1895-1921 ~ Marriages 1895-1946 ~ Deaths 1931-1963

The records show the huge numbers of people who flooded into Belfast to work and the marriage records include the addresses of the parents of the bride and groom. The baptism records include confirmation and marriage dates and locations. Holy family does not have a graveyard but the death records record the place of burial.



#### IRISHGENEALOGY.IE

The Irish Government sponsored website has now got the indexes to Civil Registration back online. #### DID YOU KNOW?

The PUBLIC RECORD OFFICE of NORTHERN IRELAND has made recordings of many of its lectures available on YouTube.

#### WOODLAND TRUST

The Woodland Trust's First World War Centenary Wood in Ireland is Brackfield Wood in the Faughan Valley, Co. Londonderry and consists of 53 acres of grassland stretching along the banks of the River Faughan. Individuals can dedicate a tree to a fallen service person for a donation of £20. 15,000 trees have been planted so far and planting will continue until the end of 2018.

#### SCOTTISH LINKS



Intimations is the Watt Library's index of over 100,000 family notices containing details of births, marriages and deaths as seen in the pages of the Greenock Advertiser, Greenock Telegraph and other local newspapers from 1800 until 1915.

The notices are sorted by surname, and then first name and the entry details include the name and date of the publication. The **Intimations** index is also available for perusal in hard copy form at the Watt Library.

The birth, marriage and death notices include information about folk who lived in the Greenock area but who had originated in Ireland and also folk who lived in Ireland but who were originally from the Greenock area.

For example Agnes Cooper of Port Glasgow married John Duncan of Oban at Ballymena on 25 December 1894.

#### NIFHS DNA PROJECT

There has been fast growing interest in genealogical DNA testing as a means of making contact with 'cousins,' or to verify research. Last year Ballymena Branch committee arranged for Dr. Maurice Gleeson, from Family Tree DNA, to give a talk on how DNA test results can help to connect families. The talk was attended by members from several other branches and follow up discussions resulted in the North of Ireland Family History Society having its own DNA project.

Anyone can join the project but only members of NIFHS will get discount on the testing kit.

#### THE ALLEN Y-DNA PROJECT



The Allen DNA Project is partnering with the Allen Guild of One Name Studies in an exciting new Research Endeavour. The Allen DNA Project is a US based group, but

is very interested in expanding its membership to a world-wide audience by actively seeking out Allens from England, Scotland, Ireland, Mainland Europe, Canada, Australia, New Zealand or anywhere else on the planet. Additionally, any spelling variation of the Allen surname is welcome: Allan, Allyn, Allin, etc.

To this point, FREE yDNA 37 marker tests will be made available to any males carrying the Allen surname and residing outside the United States who are willing to join the project and participate in the testing. The only requirement for a **free** yDNA test in a known Allen/Allan (any spelling) lineage to at least the participant's Great Grand-father Allen/Allan (any spelling) in any country. Additionally, the Allen DNA Project is setting aside a specific Sub-group within the Project with a full commitment of assistance from Allen Project Co-Administrator Dr. Eric Allen who will be overseeing this specific International Sub-group.

Our Research Centre has Thom's Directories of Ireland ranging from 1853 to 1997. As well as inhabitants in the counties of Ireland the 1853 directory includes Army and Navy lists which include promotions from 1800.

Our volunteers cannot undertake a general search for a surname.
