Ballycarry Project



Following on from the meteoric growth of our DNA project over the last few years, the North of Ireland Family History Society has decided to take the bold step to take things to the next level.

Recognising that many people will never take a DNA test, we have decided to carry out mass testing on descendants of those who used to live in the small historic village of Ballycarry in County Antrim. By providing free tests and managing them within the society, we hope to encourage lots of people to test who would otherwise not do so. This will help us find connections within a small community with the objective of finding confirmed links between people and reconstructing family trees back beyond paper records.

This is an exciting project and we arranged a launch meeting in the village of Ballycarry on Tuesday 8 October at 7.45pm. On that evening Anne Johnston and Martin McDowell explained more about the project and, along with David Hume from the Ballycarry & District Community Association, encouraged volunteers, who met the project criteria, to test their DNA.



New Publications

Lisburn Branch launched a new publication in the Researching Your Ancestors in the North of Ireland series at the Society's AGM in September 2019.

Entitled *'Lisburn Parish of Blaris'*, the booklet is full of information about the history of the area and references many useful sources for research. It is available for sale through the shop on our website – nifhs.org. This booklet is the contribution from Lisburn Branch to the Society's 40 Year Anniversary celebrations.

Fermanagh Genealogy Archives

Anyone researching ancestors in the Fermanagh area will find a feast of information on the Ireland Genealogy Project website - http://www.igp-web.com/Fermanagh/Links.htm .

Parish records, census information, police and military records - to name but a few sources available and free of charge. Browse the site and you'll find information about other areas too. I've said it before and I think it bears repeating, there's loads of information available without paying a huge fee to an online provider. Take a little time and you will reap benefits. Having said all of that, don't forget your own Society's county booklets:- Fermanagh, Tyrone, Monaghan, Cavan, Derry-Londonderry, all available through the NIFHS online shop.



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Irishgenealogy.ie - a helpful feature

This great site has all the Irish civil registration indexes plus very many actual images. Some images are not online yet and it is frustrating to find your record but then realise that it is one of the images which is not available yet. If the event occurred in what is now Northern Ireland, you can go to the GRONI site and get an image for £2.50. However, if the event took place in what is now Republic of Ireland e.g. like this marriage recently searched for - it may not be widely known that Irishgenealogy.ie provide an online facility to purchase a copy of the image for 4 Euro.




But if you click on the person's name, it takes you to this second screen as shown on the right.

Click on the link in the message at the bottom right.

That will take you to a screen where you will see this. Click on the link at the bottom right.

If after a search you see a result which at the bottom right shows, the Quarter, Volume and Page etc, that means there is no image on the website yet.


want to get a copy of a certificate, what do I do

1.If you would like to request a photocopy of the Birth/Marriage/Civil Partnership/Death entry (for genealogy and research purposes),

a. A photocopy of an entry in any register can be purchased from the General Register Office by downloading the form here and submitting it by e-mail, fax or post as outlined on the form, or

This window will open, and if you click OK it opens the relevant Application Form.

The next page will show how to complete the Form, submit it, make payment online and then receive the image by email.






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To complete it on your computer - Click **Enable Editing** - This is an example of a completed form.





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Once you have completed the Form, you should Save it to your pc. You then send an email to the address at the top of the completed form - with a copy of the completed Form attached. In a few days, GRO Ireland will reply and ask you to pay the 4 Euro fee, by using their online facility with Worldpay. An acknowledgement will be emailed to you. About a week later GRO Ireland will email you and attach a copy of the image of the Marriage which you had purchased. You may then save the image to your own computer. These images will eventually all be online at Irishgenealogy.ie but in the meantime, the above provides an easy way to obtain the image at a reasonable cost.

Map Versions

For many locations, several different map versions exist for the same location. These various versions correspond to the different years in which map sheets relating to Griffith's Valuation were updated. The exact year of revision/publication for each of these versions has not been possible to identify. The earliest map versions are those in black and white sketch and the latest versions are those in coloured print.

To view different versions of a map sheet/location, click on the arrows below the 'Map Version' heading located on the upper right side of the map view. For some locations/map sheets, only one map version may exist, while for other locations/sheets, up to 8 versions may exist (and up to 12 for Dublin City).

Also, there are 2 extra features described below - coverage seems to be widespread in the Republic of Ireland sadly, very little in the 6 counties of Northern Ireland, but quite a lot in Donegal, Monaghan and Cavan.



Town Plans symbol - Historical town plans are available for towns and many villages throughout the country. Click Show Towns to show towns within 10km of the centre of the map. Click Hide Towns to hide the town plans.

Name Books symbol - As part of the townland survey and mapping of Ireland in the first half of the nineteenth century, individual place name details and variants were collected in order to determine a suitable spelling for each name which did not already have a standardised English form. This information was recorded in a series of volumes known as Name Books. Click Show Name Books to show the Name Books within the current view. Click Hide Name Books to hide the Name Books.

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
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


Extracts of 2 of versions of the Town Plan of
