LOOK UP SERVICE UPDATE

1st Broughshane Presbyterian Church

Just completed and available for 'Look up' is a set of Baptism records from 1st Broughshane Presbyterian Church. There are over 5,000 entries dating from 6 Oct 1830-30 Sep 1832 and 17 Feb 1836-2 Dec 1894. There are only 6 entries which include birth dates.

There are very few baptisms noted as illegitimate births, but there are many instances where only a mother is recorded. An occasional note records that the father is of a different faith, but most have no additional information. On checking one of the entries in Civil Registration I discovered that Maria White, baptized on 18 April 1875, with only her mother Mary White recorded, did have a father, James White, and he was in Australia.

So, in the entries before Civil Registration in 1864, where only the mother is recorded, we don't know whether a mother's surname is a married name.

LIBRARIES NI -HERITAGE FROM HOME 2

Tuesday 12 October 2021 - March 2022

Following the success of last year's *Heritage from Home* series of online talks, Libraries NI are organising a second series this autumn and winter. *Heritage from Home 2* will run from October to mid-March and is part of a government-funded Shared History project. The funding was allocated by the National Heritage Lottery Fund.

In this centenary year, the programme will focus more specifically on the social context, historical events and impact on people and institutions of the creation of Northern Ireland, but will also more generally explore how life in Northern Ireland and border areas has evolved within the last 100 years. The aim will be to provide a critical look at the last century from a variety of perspectives, through talks by speakers with different backgrounds and interests (History, Politics, Architecture, Genealogy, the Arts and Museums and Archives).

All these events will be delivered via Zoom and can be followed on PC, laptop, iPad and on most smartphones.



WE NEED YOUR HELP

HAVE YOU GOT SKILLS AND EXPERIENCE TO HELP IN THESE NIFHS VOLUNTARY POSITIONS?

Assistant Treasurer: Key duties include:

- The Society Treasurer's day to day role revolves around the Cashbook, a spreadsheet in which are recorded all the payments and receipts. Each such transaction is supported by a voucher, e.g. an invoice, two copies of which are kept: one online and one on paper, filed in the Society's Office in Newtownabbey.
- The Society has bank accounts with Danske Bank and PayPal and the Treasurer reconciles the bank transactions with those in the Cashbook spreadsheet; again, two copies are kept of each bank statement.
- Particularly towards the end of the financial year, March 31st, liaison is required with each of the Branch Treasurers as their accounts need to be combined with those of the Society to produce a consolidated statement. This is then approved by an Independent Examiner before being sent to the Charity Commission.
- The Assistant Treasurer should become sufficiently familiar with the procedures to step in when the Treasurer is away. Preferably the Assistant Treasurer should be able to visit the Research Centre at Newtownabbey occasionally.

Webmaster: Key duties include:

- WordPress Core Updates
- Theme and Plugin Updates
- Hosting Support
- Website Security and Legal Compliance

The Society's web asset would be under the control of the Webmaster, who should preferably be resident in Northern Ireland. A sub-committee is investigating the requirements for a new website and the Webmaster would contribute to that.
