# LOOK-UP SERVICE

## Wellington Street Presbyterian Church, Ballymena, Co. Antrim

The baptism records for Wellington Street Presbyterian Church have now been transcribed. They run from 1863-1902, with a few before that date.

There are no father's occupations recorded in the records, but mothers' maiden names are recorded consistently throughout, with few exceptions.

Many of these records seem to have been copied at some time, probably from an old register, as there are names that have been recorded incorrectly, but the shape of the word is the same. This became clear when the records were sorted alphabetically and grouped in families. There are also entries with 2 surnames in the Surname column of the register, and when checking these against Civil Registration it showed that one of the surnames was actually the child's second forename, often the mother's maiden name.

Most of the families lived in Ballymena and surrounding areas but there are 7 families giving Belfast as their address, 3 Glasgow and 2, (the CAIRNS and LETTERS families), America.

The baptism records are now available for "Look up" and have been printed for the library.

This adds to our transcriptions of the three other Presbyterian Churches in Ballymena:

1st BallymenaBaptisms 1812-1901, Marriages 1814-1819 and 1840-18452nd Ballymena, High KirkBaptisms 1813-19213rd Ballymena, West ChurchBaptisms 1829-1900, Marriages 1830-1832

The Bready Ancestry website has a lot to offer if you have any connection to the north-west of Co Tyrone. The website has a searchable genealogical database containing nearly 30,000 individual records relating to the families who lived in the townlands of Bready over the past 400 years. Records from churches, burial grounds, schools, and the Abercorn Estate, to name but a few, are available on the website. **Access is free**. The website was updated in 2021 and plays an important role in the work of the Bready & District Ulster Scots Development Association.

# CHURCH OF ENGLAND GRAVEYARD MAPPING PROJECT

Back in August 2021 the Church of England moved to the second phase of their National Burial Grounds Survey. Phase 1 saw the creation of a digital map and database of burial grounds in England, accessible through the Church Heritage Record –

The record contains over 16,000 entries on church buildings and burial grounds in England. This second phase will record the grave memorials and, eventually, every grave memorial in every Anglican churchyard in the country will be listed. The new free web-based record system is due to launch next spring, with the option to subscribe to additional services. The project is due to take about seven years to complete.

To quote Andrew Rumsey, the C of E's lead bishop for church buildings.

"This impressive national project will make a huge difference to those researching family history. It will soon be possible to visit almost any Anglican burial ground in the country and see in real time the location of burial plots. For those researching at distance in the UK or overseas, the digital records will place detailed information from churchyards at their fingertips."
