LISBURN BRANCH 40TH ANNIVERSARY

Lisburn Branch celebrated their 40th Anniversary of the founding of the Branch with an Afternoon Tea at the Ballance House, Glenavy on Saturday 25th June.

A suggestion in a Family History class in Lisburn led to a first meeting on June 2nd, 1982, of 20 people interested in forming a branch of the North of Ireland Family History Society. Two of those who attended that meeting are still members and two others were members until very recently.



The event began with a virtual trip through the last 40 years in the Branch, remembering the people who gave so much of their time and effort, the places visited for research and pleasure and the projects successfully completed. Before enjoying a delicious Afternoon Tea, a Living History re-enactor demonstrated the etiquette of Afternoon Tea hosting.

As the event was held in the Ballance House, the ancestral home of John Ballance, run by the Ulster New Zealand Trust, there was an exhibition showing the Family History links of Lisburn members to New Zealand.





NEW ADDITIONS TO THE LOOK UP LIST

TOBERKEIGH PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH - Baptisms 1829-1902, Marriages 1830-1869

Toberkeigh Presbyterian Church is situated in the north of Co. Antrim. The baptisms were transcribed by volunteers from AllState, under the leadership of Imelda McVeigh. There are 1483 baptisms, with only about 165 mothers' names recorded, and no parents' occupations. There are 8 sets of twins and 4 children identified as illegitimate, although there are more than 20 with just mothers' names. The most common surname is McCurdy, with 117 baptisms recorded!

We have also transcribed 187 marriages from 1830 to 1869. Most of the places of residence recorded are in the locality, but 2 are worth noting. Mary Murry married John Murrey of Paisley, Scotland in 1833 and Ellen McPherson married William Garner of Glasgow in 1841.

1ST DROMARA PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, CO. DOWN -

Baptisms 1816-1874, Marriages 1817-1845, Burials 1750-1972

The handwriting in these baptism records was particularly difficult to decipher. For example, what looked like WALLAN was clear as WALLACE in a different entry for the same family. The surname WALLAN could not be found in other sources in this part of Ireland, so the 79 baptisms have been recorded as WALLACE. If you know that it should be WALLAN please let us know before we print in a few weeks' time. With few exceptions, mothers' names with maiden name are recorded, as are places of residence. Twenty sets of twins are recorded and one set of triplets. We are working on another baptism register for this church, which will take the records up to 1922.

In the marriage records from 1817 up until 1821, only the names of the bride and groom are recorded. From 1821 to 1823 names of witnesses are recorded and from 1824 other details are included such as fathers' names, places of residence, where the marriage took place and who authorised the marriage. Several marriages took place in the early hours of the morning: 1 am, 2 am, and even 4 am! Two of the marriages took place in Belfast -

Robert Mulholland of Stranmillis and Anne Cairn of Belfast married in Belfast in 1833.

Robert Curry of Carnew and Letitia Carson of Ballynahatty married in Belfast in 1835.

The more than 1,200 burial records include additional information that has been gleaned from gravestones, newspapers, and wills, providing information for some individuals on relationships, place of birth and cause of death.

PORTMORE CEMETERY - Burial records 1894-1929

Portmore Cemetery is in Co. Antrim and lies on the eastern side of Lough Neagh, southwest of Glenavy. We have transcribed 462 burials from a register which records, for most entries, name, age, religion, occupation, and last places of residence, many of which are the surrounding townlands but also 135 entries with addresses in Belfast.

UPDATE FROM THE VOLUNTEERS AT THE RESEARCH LIBRARY SUBCOMMITTEE

Opening arrangements for the Research Centre, and a further call for Volunteers to help in the Research Library.

The Research Centre is now open for private research, by prior arrangement only, via the NIFHS website at -

These arrangements and the introduction of a booking system are for all Society members, groups of Society members who may wish to attend together, and for visitors and members of the general public, for private research. Society Volunteer, Kathleen Morrison has kindly agreed to coordinate the booking system. The introduction of a booking system will enable Kathleen to schedule opening times according to demand and the availability of Research Library Volunteers. This will also enable the Society to monitor the use of the Research Library facilities which will be helpful for future planning. It is our intention, at this stage, to open on Tuesdays and possibly on Thursdays, if volunteers are available, from 11am until 8pm offering 3x3hour research sessions accommodating up to four researchers with two volunteers for each three-hour slot. Current Department of Health advice will be followed, and the opening arrangements will be kept under review in the weeks and months ahead, which will enable any necessary changes to be quickly implemented according to the demand, and the availability of Volunteers. Please be assured that the new arrangements have been thought through very carefully and that they will be as flexible and user friendly as possible. The 'Volunteers at the Research Library Team' will make sure of that! A very thorough cleaning programme has taken place throughout the Research Centre and a portable Air Purifier has been purchased. New vertical blinds have been installed in the Randal Gill Library and the Journal Room.

Many thanks to all the members of the subcommittee, past and present, and to all others who have helped with the arrangements in any way - your help is very much appreciated!

The opening arrangements for the Research Centre, are, as has always been the case, dependant on willing and available Volunteers.
